# Our Ideals

## Professional Leadership

This is a key factor in bringing about change. All leaders need to be proactive, participate and share leadership, and have real knowledge of what goes on in the classroom.

## Shared Vision and Goals

Effective schools build consensus on the aims and values of the school, and develop a sense of community. This school will provide a unity of purpose, a consistency of practice, and ownership through collegiality and collaboration.

## A Learning Environment

The shared vision and values determine our ethos. Our school will have an orderly environment and an attractive working environment, including the display of pupil's work.

## Concentration on Teaching and Learning

Effectiveness is clearly dependent on effective classroom teaching. It is vital that our school focuses on quality as well as the quantity of teaching and learning. We will make maximum use of learning time and place an emphasis on mastery of basic skills, with clear targets for improvement and success.

## Purposeful Teaching

We believe that quality teaching is at the heart of effective schooling. Such teaching is based on efficient organisation with teachers clear about their objectives. Pupils are aware of the purposes of structured lessons with teachers making use of a range of explicit teaching strategies. Effective teachers are those who use adaptive practice to modify and adapt curriculum material to suit student individual differences.

## High Expectations

Positive high expectations are one of the most important factors. Teachers set high standards to challenge and monitor progress. High expectations also apply to teachers. Teachers convey and reinforce high expectations. Pupils are encouraged to use their creative imagination, powers of problem solving and develop self-evaluative skills.

## Positive Reinforcement

This occurs where there is clear and fair discipline where pupils feel they belong and are able to participate. Direct and positive feedback has a positive effect with student behaviour and praise needs to be specific, spontaneous and varied.

## Monitoring Progress

Well-established mechanisms for monitoring the progress of pupils, classes, the school as a whole, and improvement programmes are vital. Monitoring by itself has little effect but is an important ingredient in our school to determine school wide progress.

## Pupils Rights and Responsibilities

We believe that there are considerable gains to be made when pupils' self-esteem is raised and when they have an active role and have responsibility for their own learning.

## Home School Partnership

Supportive relations and cooperation between home and our school have positive effects. We strongly believe that the relationship between the individual teacher and the parent(s) is critical.

## Learning Community

We view our school as a learning organisation where all aspects of the school are interrelated. We continuously embed staff development within collegial and collaborative whole school improvement, ensuring that ideas and initiatives are shared and celebrated.

## Admissions

Although the admission arrangements are controlled by the LA, the school has an open admission policy for all pupils, subject to the statutory standard number (currently 30 pupils per year). Pupils can attend our school the day after their third birthday. Pupils with disabilities are welcomed and offered equal rights and opportunities at Llangyfelach Primary School.



## The School Day

School starts at 8.45am and the teachers are responsible for the children from 8.45am onwards. We are obliged to mark pupils late if they arrive in school after the main gates are locked.

- ✚ **Morning Session:** 8:45am - 12 noon
- ✚ **Afternoon Session:** 12:45pm - 3:00pm
- ✚ **Morning Nursery Session:** 8:45am - 11:30am
- ✚ **Afternoon Nursery Session:** 1:00pm – 3:00pm

Pupils in Years 1-6 leave the building through the exits located off the main hall. Parents should wait for pupils in the top yard. All pupils will line up and stay within the building. They will only be allowed to leave once they have identified the adult collecting them to the teacher. In Years 5 and 6 pupils may walk home providing they have written permission from a parent. In the Foundation Phase pupils will not be allowed to leave the building until a parent or guardian has arrived. **Please inform us if someone else will be collecting your child.** Reception children are dismissed directly from their classroom into the infant yard.

## End of the Day

We request that parents wait for their children in the school yard. Younger children will be brought to the outer doors by the teachers. You will be asked to complete a contact form outlining people who might collect your child/ren. Staff adhere strictly to this list. Please help us by ensuring it is up-to-date at all times.

We ask parents to bring children to school punctually. If children are absent from school parents are requested to inform the school via message, telephone or answer phone message. The school maintains an absence register. We work closely with the school's Education Welfare Officer who will assist parents who are having difficulty with their children's attendance. We are very keen to support any parents who are having difficulty collecting or bringing their child to school. Please contact the Headteacher who will be happy to offer advice and support.

## Jewellery

In the interests of health and safety, pupils are not allowed to wear jewellery, which could injure the child concerned, or other children. It is best kept for home and weekend wear.



### Absence due to illness

If your child is ill from school for medical reasons, please contact the office as soon as possible on the first day of absence. You may register your child's absence by leaving a message on the Absence Line (01792 771497 – Option 1), by email at [llangyfelach.primary@swansea-edunet.gov.uk](mailto:llangyfelach.primary@swansea-edunet.gov.uk) or by speaking directly to your child's teacher.

### If your child becomes ill in school hours

We will contact you at once. Please ensure that we have up to date details of your home, work and mobile numbers plus details of someone we can contact if you are unavailable.

## Hospital, Doctor and Dental appointments

Please let us know in writing in advance if your child will be out of school. Children must be collected and returned to school. Please ensure you sign your child both out and back in for Health & Safety reasons.

## Medication

Parents should provide the Headteacher with full information about their child's medical needs so that we can make appropriate provision. Children who need long-term medication e.g. for asthma, diabetes, epilepsy or severe allergies must have whatever they need in school. Wherever possible parents should accept the administration of medicines as their own responsibility and short term prescription requirements should only be brought to school if it is detrimental to the child's health not to have medicine during the school day. If it is unavoidable that a child should take medicine in school, then the following rules must apply:

Parents are responsible for the provision of the medication in the original container as dispensed by the pharmacy bearing a clear label showing:

- ✚ the name of the medication
- ✚ the name of the patient
- ✚ the dosage
- ✚ specific directions for the administration
- ✚ precautions relating to the medication storage requirements
- ✚ the name of the dispensing pharmacist/doctor
- ✚ the date the issue and the expiry date

**\*\*Medicines not in the original container showing a pharmacy label WILL NOT be accepted in school\*\***

Parents must bring medicines into the office and complete an authorisation form. Forms are available to download from the school's website. Hard copies are available on request.

The school will not dispose of medicines. Parents are responsible for ensuring that date-expired medicines are returned to a pharmacy for safe disposal.

## Requests for leave of absence during term time

We at Llangyfelach Primary School believe that attendance at school is important and that absence can lead to poor progress and poor attainment. Families taking holidays during term time is a cause of absence which has been highlighted nationally as a disruptive factor in a pupil's education.

## School Meals

School meals are freshly prepared each day on the premises by City & County of Swansea catering staff. We have adopted a healthy eating policy and the cook will be pleased to discuss any queries regarding your child's meal.



Presently the price of a Primary School meal is £2.25 per day, which is payable via the online payment service – sQuid.

Packed lunches may be brought to school in unbreakable plastic containers but must not include hot drinks, soup, etc. Provision is made for children to eat packed lunches and they are subject to the same rules and supervision as those taking a school meal. We would be extremely grateful if you would support our Healthy Eating Policy by providing a healthy lunch box where possible.

### **Positive Behaviour**

We aim to provide a happy atmosphere in which staff and parents work together for the welfare of the children. We strive to provide a climate where children adopt certain standards of behaviour and values to develop a sense of self-discipline and an acceptance of responsibility for their actions.

We encourage children to be polite, well mannered, helpful to each other and to become good citizens. The principle that underpins our approach to school behaviour is that no-one has the right to prevent another child from learning or a teacher from teaching.

We aim to give all our children a shared sense of pride in attending Llangyfelach Primary School and to feel that it is a place where they are safe to learn without disruption.



### **Homework**

Every term each pupil will bring home a 'Homework Booklet' which mirrors the 4 stages of our Cornerstone Curriculum – Engage, Research, Create and Share.

- The **Engage** stage offers an initial stimulus for the homework project to generate enthusiasm for the topic studied.
- The **Research** stage offers opportunities and strategies to gain further and deeper understanding of the project theme.
- The **Create** stage provides ideas for pupils to present their research in readiness for the final stage.
- The **Share** stage enables children to present their homework projects to their peers and class teacher.

They will also have an opportunity to reflect on their learning in order to suggest improvements that can be made when undertaking their next project. This system is designed to help you support your child's development; share the topic of study for the term and to inform you on the types of learning activities undertaken at school.

Additionally, all children will also receive Literacy (Spelling) and Numeracy homework every week to help support and extend the learning that has taken place in lessons that week.

### **Equal opportunities for pupils**

The Governing Body and school promote equal opportunities and good relations between persons of different racial groups and between males and females. The school maintains and records any reported racist incidents and how they are resolved.

All pupils are entitled to attend our school. The school adheres to the Disability Discrimination Act 1995.



### **Complaints Procedures**

If you have a complaint under Section 23 of the Education Reform Act, relating to the curriculum, religious education or religious worship, the Local Authority has prepared a Formal Complaints Procedure, a copy of which is available from the school, the Education Department or a Public Library.

In the event of any complaint you should first try to resolve the matter by making an appointment to discuss the issue with the Headteacher. Further advice may be obtained from the Education Department, County Hall, Swansea. Telephone number 01792 636000.



### **Charging and Remissions**

Under Section 10 of the 1988 Education Act, the Governing Body has determined that parents be invited to make voluntary contributions towards the benefit of the school or to support particular activities, for example educational visits in order to offset transport costs and entrance fees. The school is firmly committed to the belief that children learn best from first hand experiences and these visits are planned to enhance and enrich each child's education.

## **Health & Safety**

As a school we are committed to ensuring the Health and Safety of all pupils and staff. All entrances are locked and to gain access there are video and key code entry systems. Any visitor who accesses the building is met by a key member of staff and escorted to the appropriate place.

The school holds a visitors' log to keep a record of all visits to the school. The school has a designated first aid officer. If an accident occurs in school, the school will contact parents and carers, advising them if medical attention is required. An accident log is maintained. The school complies with all LA procedures regarding reporting incidents on school premises.



## **Facilities and Access**

Llangyfelach Primary has recently refurbished toilet facilities and are of a very good standard. All toilet facilities can be accessed from all areas of the school. The school also has a high end security system to ensure the safety of all members of the school community while in our care. For ease of access to all areas of the school, we have an elevator located near the main entrance and the reception entrance. The school's Accessibility Policy and plan is currently being updated to reflect recent work undertaken within the school.



# The National Curriculum

## Key Skills

“The ability to use a range of skills effectively is crucial to every learner from early years, through statutory education and into life-long learning. We all need to communicate, to use mathematical, creative and problem-solving skills, to benefit from the use of information technology and to develop personal and social skills.” – Skills Across the Curriculum (ACCAC 2002)

## Foundation Phase (3-7 years old)

The pupils in our Infant department follow the six areas of learning described in the document “Framework for Children’s Learning for 3 to 7 year-olds in Wales”. The activities and experiences planned make a positive contribution to children’s early development and learning. Key learning skills are developed such as listening, speaking, concentration and learning to work together and co-operate with other children. It also develops early literacy and numeracy skills that will prepare children for Key Stage Two.

At this stage the main building blocks of learning experiences are laid. The emphasis will be on developing essential skills of communication, literacy and numeracy. By providing a broad, rich curriculum using an integrated approach, we aim to develop the children’s interests whilst also recognising their level of maturity. These are important years where children learn how to observe, listen, respond and develop not only as individuals but also as caring members of our community.

## Key Stage 2 (8-11 years old)

We have developed a ‘project’ based approach in Key Stage Two that builds on the Foundation Phase, is skills based, and relevant to today’s children. The essential skills of communication, literacy and numeracy will still be the central focus of our curriculum. Children will be encouraged to develop self-confidence, independence in learning and higher order skills in a range of situations. The school’s Teaching and Learning Policy outlines how children learn and are taught at Llangyfelach Primary School, which can be accessed from our school website policy section.

## Areas of Learning and Programs of Study (Previously LNF)

Literacy and numeracy skills are absolutely essential in order for young people to reach their potential whether they are planning to enter further or higher education or the employment market. The **AoL** and **PoS** (Previously **LNF**) has been developed as a curriculum planning tool for schools that will provide a continuum of development, clearly setting out annual expected outcomes in literacy and numeracy.



The LNF builds on the current good practice that exists in many schools. It aims to help bring about coherent approaches to developing literacy and numeracy across the curriculum.



At Llangyfelach Primary School, we have mapped the curriculum throughout all year groups to ensure that we maximise opportunities to enrich literacy and numeracy experiences in all contexts for learning. All subject leaders are responsible for mapping the LNF within their subjects and in line with our Cornerstone Curriculum.

## Cornerstone

The Curriculum is based on our Cornerstones of Learning: Engage; Develop; Innovate and Express. The philosophy combines both national and international research and is blended with the best approaches to successful, fun and innovative teaching and learning. These Cornerstones form the essential foundation of outstanding teaching and learning and underpin this curriculum.

Each project has:

- ✚ **A focus subject**, for example science. Within that focus subject there is a learning focus. *(For example in the project Electric Rainbow the focus subject is science with a learning focus of light, electricity and colour.);*

- ✚ **A focus on a specific writing genre** at the heart of the learning. *(For example in Electric Rainbow the writing genre is poetry writing.);*

- ✚ **A range of other subjects** that enrich the focus subject. *(For example in Electric Rainbow the art focus is painting - colour mixing.);*



- ✚ Aspects of **mathematics** included where appropriate. However numeracy teaching will be mostly done discretely as will aspects of phonics, spelling and reading in literacy;

- ✚ **RE** is taught discretely and is a compulsory element within the curriculum and is taught in accordance with the local authorities' agreed syllabus. The school's acts of collective worship are broadly Christian in nature. Parents are entitled to withdraw children wholly or in part from Religious Education and collective worship.

## Welsh @ Llangyfelach Primary School

Welsh is taught as a second language. Children will follow a curriculum to develop spoken and written Welsh. At Llangyfelach Primary School we strive to create a Welsh ethos by emphasising the importance of the language and by encouraging the use of incidental Welsh in day-to-day routines. We also endeavour to create a bilingual learning environment where all signage, displays and information is displayed in Welsh and English

We encourage pupils to develop an awareness of Wales as a country and its culture by providing opportunities and promoting 'Y Cwricwlwm Cymreig'. This can be done through a range of subjects such as History, Art, Music, Geography and forms elements of our ESDGC curriculum.

We also encourage participation from the school community in the celebration of St. David's Day during our 'Welsh Week'. Pupils take part in a range of competitions and achievements are celebrated during our whole school assembly.

## Education for Sustainable Development and Global Citizenship (ESDGC)

We have appointed a team to lead this area (Miss Gaffney, Miss Nicholas & Mr Higgins) who have worked extremely hard to map the 7 main themes to the whole school curriculum in all phases. This ensures that staff have the ideas and resources available to them in order to explore ESDGC issues within their topics and themes. The 7 themes are Choices and Decisions, Consumption and Waste, Climate Change, Wealth and Poverty, Identity and Culture, Health and Natural Environment. Each topic throughout the school has been analysed in order to match and maximise learning opportunities in these themes.

We have achieved the Healthy Schools Award and are in the process of achieving our Eco-Schools Green Flag Award. Our Eco-Council are extremely organised and regularly keep us all on track to ensure we carry out

## Educational Visits

Children thoroughly enjoy our educational visits and learning from first hand experiences. We have an extensive programme of educational visits linked to different areas of the curriculum. We are not allowed to charge but may request a voluntary contribution. Parents experiencing difficulty in meeting costs are always welcome to approach the Headteacher to discuss payment systems.

We organise residential visits throughout the year for Years 5 and 6 Classes, when available. These are excellent opportunities for studies, field work, environmental and social education.



### **Medical Visitors**

From time to time, the School Nurse, Health Visitor, Dentist and Hearing Specialist will visit the school to carry out routine health inspections, dental inspections and hearing tests. Parents are always informed beforehand. If necessary, parents will be notified and advised to seek further help from either the School Health Service or family doctor. We liaise with other caring agencies when necessary and with other schools at times of transfer.

### **Sports Activities**

There is a wide range of sports activities undertaken during the year where children represent the school. These have included swimming, rugby, football, netball and athletics. Any child taking part represents the school and this is recognised as a privilege equal to

academic and artistic achievement. It also fosters team spirit and the development of skills.

We aim to give children of all abilities the opportunity to participate in competitive events. Swimming lessons are generally given to Y2 - Y6 pupils and they will need a swimming costume and towel.

### **ALN (Additional Learning Needs) and MAT (More Able and Talented)**

The school believes that every pupil has an entitlement to the full range of curricular opportunities. A whole school approach has been adopted in providing for all children who experience additional learning needs at any time during the Primary years. Any child identified by the class teacher as needing extra help will have class work differentiated at a level appropriate to their need. This includes more able and talented children.

Where a child should continue to experience difficulty, the advice of the SENCO (Special Educational Needs Coordinator) will be sought in the first instance and, if necessary, outside agencies will be brought in. Individual programmes of work are then devised, implemented and monitored on a termly basis. Parents will be consulted and kept informed at each stage.

We have support groups for pupils undertaken by highly trained staff allocated to provide appropriate intervention, in order to raise standards and improve their provision.

- ✚ *SEN Literacy:* Groups from each class are provided with support based on their specific needs. Teaching Assistants (TA) withdraw pupils in small groups for intense Literacy support. TA's evaluate learning and feedback to class teachers.
- ✚ *Fringe Groups:* Using previous National Test data, pupils in Year 2 and 6 are targeted for



specific support in order to raise levels of attainment in Outcomes and Levels.

- ✚ **MAT:** Pupils identified as More Able and Talented (MAT) are being targeted at class level, which is proving to be successful. Higher Level Teaching Assistants also withdraw MAT pupils in order to provide further extension and challenge.
- ✚ **Mild to Complex Needs:** Additional to the SEN groups the school provides specific focused groups catering for needs such as Dyslexia, DCD and Speech and Language. We are blessed with high quality resources and highly trained staff to meet the needs of all learners.



### **School Council**

At Llangyfelach Primary School we value the views and opinions of our children and believe that they should be actively involved in decision making. Over recent years we have established a successful School Council. The Council is made up of two representatives from each Y2 to Y6. Representatives are elected by ballot at the start of every school year. They then remain in office for the whole year.

The school council meet regularly to discuss issues such as the school environment and are a forum for the children's concerns. The children are encouraged to approach council members with issues.

### **PTFA**

We are fortunate in having a very active and supportive Parent Teacher Association that organise many fund raising activities over the course of an academic year from cake stalls to summer fetes. The money raised is used for a variety of projects, such as enhancing the outside play areas, providing new library resources, purchasing ICT equipment and developing our indoor areas. If you would like to get involved with our fantastic PTFA then please contact the Headteacher who will give you more information.

### **LPS Wraparound Full Day Care**

Our main aim in this initiative is to be able to provide our community with childcare and education from 7:30am to 5:30pm every day from ages 3 to 12 years.

This service has proven to be extremely successful in its aims and has surpassed our expectations. We have recently extended our ages range to 12 years. Many children from the comprehensive school are attending regularly.

Fees are paid weekly in advance; payments to be made no later than the Wednesday before the week booked. Fees are payable through cash, cheque or childcare vouchers. Please contact the school office for prices and offers.



## Sporting Aims and Achievements

Pupils are encouraged to take part in school based sporting activities and their outside achievements are also recognised and valued in school. Pupils regularly bring in their certificates to be recognised in the whole school assemblies.

An annual programme of swimming coaching has provided the opportunity for pupils to start swimming from Year 3.

We have a number of teams which take part in county tournaments and leagues such as our Football, Netball, Athletics and Cross Country teams.

## Extra-Curricular Activities/Clubs

The school has a range of clubs that are run by staff or outside agencies every day after school as well as our successful Wraparound service.

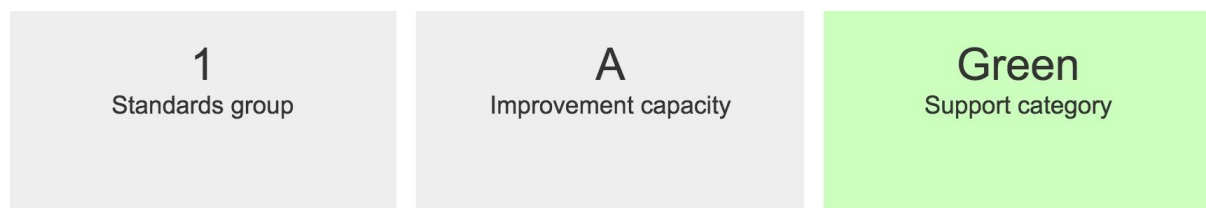

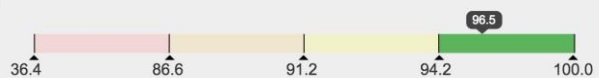

Foundation Phase indicator (FPI) and the core subject indicator (CSI)

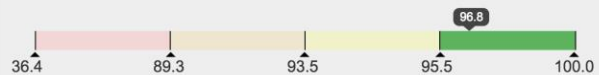

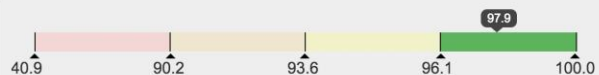
